Dear IAPT member

In South Africa we had a political party that advertised itself in the early years of democracy as "a home for all" South Africans. That sentiment was built upon notions of diversity and inclusion, so key to nation building at that time. Such calls are not without contestation and ambiguity, as noted when we wrestled with the theme of home for our conference in Canada April 2025 (the finalised title is: *(Be)Coming Home and (Re)Building Community in the Face of Displacement* – further info will be on our website soon) at the closing of our Seoul 2023 conference. The notion of home requires a recognition of past pain and possible exclusion, but is also filled with the hope of new possibilities and horizons – and in our case - the role practical theologians and religious practitioners at grassroots can play in providing alternative vistas of what home could be.

This metaphor could perhaps be appropriate for IAPT as an academic society as whole and while we, nevertheless, acknowledge the fact that it has not always been "home" for everyone, we commit to continuing to wrestle with the many different ways that home is understood and lived out by our diverse members both where they find themselves in context and within the space that is IAPT. As the new president I commit to holding space for contestation, new ideas and hopefully a growing and diverse membership that do not just feel included, but respected and valued for what you bring to the IZIKO (an isiXhosa word for "hearth" in one of our 11 South African official languages). The hearth in amaXhosa culture is traditionally and symbolically the social centre of the home, a place associated with warmth, kinship and has spiritual significance – a place where stories are told, knowledge shared and important cultural traditions take place (rituals, dance, ceremonies). It is also a hub for many activities.

In the run up to our next conference in Nova Scotia, Canada, in 2025, my hope is that IAPT be a hub where warmth, kinship, stories and knowledge is shared across generational, field specific scholarship and geographical borders. As the new executive committee we hope to serve the IAPT community by holding this space.
